DRUG COLLECTION

In order to reduce substance abuse, prevent childhood poisonings and help protect our environment, citizens may bring their unwanted or unused prescription or over-the-counter medications, sprays, inhalers, ointments, creams, vials, herbals, or pet medications to the Village Hall 24 hours every day for disposal. Illegal drugs/paraphernalia are also accepted with no questions asked. Green containers are available just inside both the east and west lobbies of Village Hall for the collection of these items.

Please do not drop off any hazardous materials or waste such as household cleaners, paint etc. or any items containing or exposed to bodily fluids. Please go through your items before bringing them into the Police Department and dispose of any items that do not meet the above criteria. Please remember this service is for private citizens only. Businesses are responsible for disposal of their own items.

Remember that no medications should ever be disposed of by flushing down a toilet. Let us dispose of them properly for you. If you have any questions regarding this program, please contact the Police Department at (262) 367-2323.



CROSSWALK SAFETY

Here is some important information to know when you are walking across the street or driving a car on a roadway. Wisconsin State Statute 346.24 explains the duties of both pedestrians and drivers when a pedestrian is crossing the roadway. There are three important points to remember when walking or driving on the roadway as it relates to crosswalks (MARKED OR UNMARKED) or when approaching an intersection:

1. The driver of a car/truck shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian, bicyclist, or electric personal assistive mobility device, consistent with the safe use of the crosswalk by anyone crossing the roadway within a marked or unmarked crosswalk. The pedestrian must be in the crosswalk (marked or unmarked)!
2. No pedestrian, bicyclist, or rider of an electric personal assistive mobility device shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk, run, or ride into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is difficult for the operator of the vehicle to yield.
3. Whenever any vehicle is stopped at an intersection or crosswalk to permit a pedestrian, bicyclist, or rider of an electric personal assistive mobility device to cross the roadway, the operator of any other vehicle approaching from the road shall not overtake and pass the stopped vehicle.



SECURITY

Please take time to keep your vehicles locked when unattended in parking lots, at work or in your driveway overnight. While Hartland enjoys a small-town charm, we have crimes of opportunity especially in the warm weather months. Additionally, don't leave valuables visible in parked motor vehicles.

We receive many complaints about scams over the phone and via the internet. There are numerous variations of these scams, but some general guidelines can help you from being the victim of fraud. Do not react quickly with giving money to others. Take the time to verify who and why you are giving money. If it does not seem right, don't do it. If you are not sure, speak to someone you trust for an opinion before acting. If in doubt, call the police department as we may have had other complaints about the scam.

TRAFFIC INITIATIVES

The department participates in various national traffic initiatives during the year that are focused on safety belt use and/or impaired driving. By participating in reporting our traffic enforcement during the enforcement periods, we become eligible for \$4,000 equipment grants. Our department has received several of the grants in the past and that is how we have paid for the radar speed pole signs located on several major roads entering the village. This year we will participate in:

Click It or Ticket - May 23, 2022 - June 5, 2022

Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over - August 19, 2022 - September 5, 2022



SAFEGUARD MAIL AND PACKAGES

The Hartland Police Department received many complaints of theft of mail and packages this year. Citizens are encouraged to be proactive when safeguarding items delivered to your home. When ordering packages online, to be delivered to your home, determine if you can pick a time of delivery. If so, have the items delivered to your home when an adult is home. Packages that sit on your front porch or in your mailboxes can be stolen. Do not leave mail in the mailbox or packages on your steps overnight.

Pay particular attention to suspicious people or vehicles in your neighborhoods. It is common for thieves who steal from the mail or from your doorstep, to follow the United States Postal trucks, UPS drivers or other delivery services. If you notice someone who may be doing this, call the police with as much information as you can. It is a great idea to get a description of a car, to include make, model, color and license plate. We ask that you do not confront anyone or put yourself in a dangerous situation. The Hartland Police Department actively patrols the Village as much as possible, but also asks for citizens to provide officers information they may never observe on their own.

ABANDONED AUTOS

Help keep Hartland looking nice. Vehicles that are abandoned, junked, discarded, dismantled, and unregistered may not be stored on private property in public view according to Hartland Municipal Code Section 62-12. This does not apply to vehicles kept in private garages.

GRILLING SAFETY

Propane Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak by smell or soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill and get it serviced by a professional before using. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. **DO NOT MOVE THE GRILL.**

- ⇒ Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- ⇒ The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- ⇒ Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- ⇒ Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- ⇒ Never leave your grill unattended.
- ⇒ Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

Charcoal Grills

- ⇒ There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- ⇒ If you use a starter fluid use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- ⇒ Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- ⇒ There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- ⇒ When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container. **DO NOT DISPOSE OF HOT COALS IN THE TRASH!**

Cooking Equipment on Balconies

For other than one and two family dwellings, **NO FUEL** for a hibachi grill, charcoal grill or other similar devices used for cooking, heating, or any other purpose, shall be **STORED** or kindled on any balcony or under any overhanging portion or within 10 feet of any structure. Electric grills may be used **ONLY** if they are UL listed and do not have an exposed heating element. The State of Wisconsin adopted NFPA1 2012 Fire Prevention Code which restricts the use of cooking grills for residential multifamily buildings of three or more units.



LIGHTNING SAFETY TIPS

Indoor Safety

- Turn off computers. Stay off corded phones, computers, and other things that put you in direct contact with electricity or plumbing. You **can use** a cell or cordless phone.
- **Do not** wash your hands, bathe, shower, do laundry, or wash dishes.

Outdoor Safety

- **If you can hear** thunder, you are within striking distance of lightning. Look for shelter inside a home, large building, or a hard-topped vehicle right away.
- **Do not go under** trees for shelter. There is no place outside that is safe during a thunderstorm.
- **Stay away** from isolated tall trees, towers or utility poles. Lightning tends to strike the taller objects in an area.
- **Stay away** from metal conductors such as wires or fences. Metal does not attract lightning, but lightning can travel long distances through it.
- If you are with a group of people, spread out. While this actually increases the chance that someone might get struck, it tends to prevent multiple injuries, and increases the chances that someone could help if a person is struck.
- **Wait at least 30 minutes** after hearing the last clap of thunder before leaving your shelter.
- **Stay away** from windows and doors. Stay off porches.
- **There is no safe place outside.** Sports fields, golf courses, and picnic areas are not safe during a lightning storm. Small sheds should not be used for shelter.
- **If a person is struck** by lightning, call 9-1-1. Get medical help right away. Cardiac arrest is the immediate cause of death for those who die from a strike. Lightning victims do not carry an electrical charge and may need first aid immediately.

WHAT YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW ABOUT LIGHTNING

Each year in the United States, there are about 25 million cloud-to-ground lightning flashes and about 300 people struck by lightning. Of those struck, about 30 people are killed and other suffer lifelong disabilities. Most of these tragedies can be prevented.

- All thunderstorms produce lightning and are dangerous. Fortunately, people can be safe if they follow some simple guidelines when thunderstorms are forecast.
- Lightning often strikes outside the area of heavy rain and may strike as far as 10 miles from any rainfall. Many lightning deaths occur ahead of storms before any rain arrives or after storms have seemingly passed and the rain has ended.
- If you hear thunder, you are in danger. Don't be fooled by blue skies. If you hear thunder, lightning is close enough to pose an immediate threat.
- Lightning leaves many victims with permanent disabilities. While only about 10% of lightning victims die, many survivors must live the rest of their lives with intense pain, neurological disabilities, depression, and other health problems.
- It is essential that people in charge of organized outdoor activities understand the dangers of lightning and have a lightning safety plan. Don't be afraid to ask. If you hear thunder, it's time to get to a safe building or vehicle. Speak out!



CURBSIDE COLLECTION SERVICE

Residential property owners have received two carts; one 64-gallon for garbage and one 96-gallon for recycling. Both refuse and recycling is collected from all households curbside on Tuesdays. Refuse/garbage is collected weekly from the container provided while recyclable materials are collected every other week. The garbage/recycling calendar on the Village's website shows recycling dates as either Week A or Week B. Locate your street on the recycling map to verify your pickup dates.

Residential property owners are required to bring the carts to the curb by 6:30 a.m. on collection days. All garbage and recycling materials must be kept separate and placed inside their respective cart. Important reminders:

- Do not place the carts in the street
- Place carts with the handles and wheels facing away from the street
- Containers must be at least 3 feet apart from each other and other items such as poles and mailboxes

- Do not place your containers out earlier than the day before collection day and be sure to take them back by the morning after collection day

Households that may need additional capacity for refuse and recycling have several options including the purchase of additional collection service. Households that are physically unable to move the containers to the curbside are encouraged to contact the Village.

YARD WASTE SITE OPEN

As you prepare your yard for summer, please be aware that the Village's Recycle and Yard Waste Site at 701 Progress Drive is now accepting yard waste.

Normal business hours for the site are:

- Second and fourth Tuesdays, 6:00 pm - 8:00 pm
- Every Friday, 9:00 am - 3:00 pm
- Second and fourth Saturdays, 9:00 am - 1:00 pm



Recycling and yard waste site is open to Village residents only. You will be asked to show a driver's license or ID to verify that your residence is located within the Village. Wood chips, compost and firewood are free of charge to residents when available. Village residents may not bring large volumes of brush such as that generated by clearing lot for new home construction. 2022 CRACK SEALING PROGRAM

The Village's annual Crack Sealing program will take place on various roadways throughout the Village. A full list and maps of the roadways that will be crack sealed as part of this year's project can be found on the village website under Public Works>Current Projects. If your roadway is planned to be crack sealed, there will be temporary no parking on the roadway 24-hours in advance and during the work on your road. The Village's Contractor will try to provide as much notification as possible to those affected by the work. Please try to avoid any roadways that are actively being crack sealed to minimize the possibility of accidentally getting tar on your tires. As the contractor progresses, they will spray a solvent on the tar that will make it safe to drive on. Please be patient if you approach a work zone and follow direction given from workers.

2022 UTILITY REHAB PROGRAM

The Village's annual Utility Rehab program will begin in mid-May and is expected to be completed by the end of July. The project involves the repair or replacement of miscellaneous manholes, storm catch basins, water valves or fire hydrants throughout the Village. The goal is to replace or rehabilitate aging infrastructure prior to the roadway being paved in the next few years. Miscellaneous work will take place on James Drive, Richards Road, Walnut Ridge Drive, Hartridge Drive, Norton Drive, Tenny Avenue, Dona Road, Anton Road, Renson Road, and Cottonwood Avenue (between Cardinal Lane and E. Capitol Drive). If you have a residence or business in an area that will be affected by construction, you will receive a letter with more project details on what you can expect during construction. Please be patient as you approach and pass through a work zone and follow any directions given from workers. We apologize in advance for any inconveniences you may experience and thank you for your patience to help us safely complete this year's project.

2022 PAVING PROGRAM

The Village's annual Paving Program will begin in early June and is expected to be completed by the end of September. The project involves the milling or pulverizing and paving of new asphalt on various roadways throughout the Village. This project will also entail miscellaneous curb and gutter removal and replacement, driveway approach replacement, sidewalk replacement, and utility structure adjustments. Work is planned for the Mary Hill Subdivision (excluding Greystone Blvd), Woodlands Court, Tenny Avenue, Dundee Lane, E. Imperial Drive (Lindenwood to Wexford), the main Village Hall parking lot, and the Ice Age Trail next to the library, between E. Park Ave and Haight Drive. If you have a residence or business in an area that will be affected by construction, you will receive a letter with more project details on what you can expect during construction. Please be patient as you approach and pass through a work zone and follow any directions given from workers. We apologize in advance for any inconveniences you may experience and thank you for your patience to help us safely complete this year's project.

DO YOU HAVE A LEAK?

Try the following to find water leaks in your home or business.

√ Record the meter reading on your water meter when no one is going to be in the home/building for at least 4 hours and no water is being used by dishwashers, washing machines, water softeners, etc. When you return, read the meter again. If the meter reading has changed, you have water leaking somewhere.

√ Put 10-12 drops of food coloring in your toilet tank; do not flush the toilet! Let stand for at least 1 hour. If the food coloring goes into the bowl, your toilet is leaking.



The first individual or family to submit all ten landmarks correctly will win a free shelter rental for 2023.





